




Brotherhood of War, Three Novels by W.E.B. Griffin


Murder on the Last Frontier by Cathy Pegau


The Angels Will Not Care by John Straley




The Curious Eat Themselves by John Straley






The Woman Who Married a Bear by John Straley

When two young girls go missing in rural Herefordshire, police constable and wizard-in-training Peter Grant is sent out of London to check that nothing supernatural is involved.





When a terrible plague takes over the faerie realm and causes its inhabitants to age unnaturally quickly, Henry and Blue must find a cure in order to save the realm.




Ganymede by Cherie Priest




Iron Axe: Books of Blood & Iron by Steven Harper


Jewel and Amulet by Michael Moorcock


No True Way: All-New Tales of Valdemar edited by Mercedes Lackey


The Faeman Quest (Faerie Wars bk. 5) by Herbie Brennan


Pathfinder Tales: Bloodbound by F. Wesley Schneider




The Jonah Watch by Jack Cady




The Love Book by Nina Solomon


The Wicked by Douglas Nicholas


The Man Who Spoke Snakish by Andrus Kivirahk

Alexander has crafted a gripping page-turner successfully blending history and fiction with magic and sorcery; truly a wonderfully and uniquely inspired novel.




All of Us and Everything by Bridget Asher
