






Whirlwind by Rick Mofina




Jewel and Amulet by Michael Moorcock





In the Shadow of Jezebel by Mesu Andrews




Tide and Tempest (Edge of Freedom Vol 3) by Elizabeth Ludwig




Rebels of the Kasbah by Joe O'Neill

Killer's Instinct by Dawn Dalton & Judith Graves






Shawn O'Brien, Town Tamer by William Johnstone


Wrath of the Savage by Charles West


Borderland Bloodbath by Jon Sharpe


Magic Man by J. R. Roberts


Ruler of the Realm (Faerie Wars bk. 3) by Herbie Brennan


Cotton's Inferno: A Sheriff Cotton Burke Western by Phil Dunlap


The Wicked by Douglas Nicholas


How to Paint a Cat by Rebecca M. Hale


Heritage of Lancaster County by Beverly Lewis


Valley of Fire by Johnny D. Boggs


We Are Here by Michael Marshall


The Years of Rice and Salt by Kim Stanley Robinson

The Miracle Thief by Iris Anthony



Elizabeth's Journey by Shirley Stephenson




Ganymede by Cherie Priest


Cockroaches: The 2nd Inspector Harry Hole Novel by Jo Nesbo


The Spinning Heart by Donal Ryan


The Orphans of Race Point By Patry Francis


A Table by the Window by Hillary Manton Lodge


The Longest Ride by Nicholas Sparks


Tapestry of Fortunes by Elizabeth Berg


Death by the Book by Julianna Deering


Hunting Season by Andrea Camilleri

The Cold Song by Linn Ullmann




The Striker by Clive Cussler


The Eye of God by James Rollins


Harlequin's Millions By Bohumil Hrabal


The Natural Order of Things by Kevin Keating


Days of Wine and Roquefort By Avery Aames


My Year of Meats by Ruth Ozeki


The Other Side by Alfred Kubin



This isn't a male-bashing book about how men should be more like women, but a book about how men actually are, and how women can use this understanding to get what they need from their relationships.




A Calculus of Color: The Integration of Baseball's American League by Robert McGregor
